I had served as an instructor in that unit prior to forming the bomb unit for my department. That March was very peaceful.

Funny, how much our individual perspectives change over the years. What is not so funny, is to realize that as I age I often find that it is sometimes way more difficult to remember some of the events of yesteryear, that were once so prevalent in my memory. The most recent interview was more recollections for a local TV station that wanted details for yet another anniversary documentary on the 1968 riots in Washington, DC following the assassination of Dr. King.

Thinking about those events and my involvement with them, as well as the many other demonstrations, details, and special events such as JFK;s funeral; Gen. McArthur's funeral; the May Day demonstrations; all of the anti-war, and anti-government demonstrations; and the Watergate break-in make me realize just how much historical events have taken place in this area.

I was actively involved with the Watergate situation from the initial early hours when the "burglars" were first discovered, all the way through discovering and identifying the first found electronic "bugs", subsequent investigation which continued all the way through the long federal trial where I had to testify. Now-a-days, I can really realize just how much an individual forgets, or "files away" many remembrances of past events. That is just one of the many reasons that I hope that our HP web site will help to keep memories of the 62<sup>nd</sup> HP in some minds for a while longer.

Regarding our photo albums. Let me first say that I do NOT like the way our photos display! I would like to be able to place the photos in an orderly manner, and have them remain that way without suddenly changing. It would also be great to be able to add new photos into the same order. Obviously, the names, caption, or other photo info should display properly all the time. I have received several inquiries from our members and friends asking questions about these matters, so I am including this info for clarification.

We are forced by necessity to do things on the *cheap*. We have to save money, so we have had to utilize the most cost-effective means to host our web site. For a while, we had free hosting, now we pay a small fee for the main web-site hosting; and host the majority of the photos on a free photo web site that we can link to. This puts us at the mercy of that photo site and their often changing rules and end user agreements.

Those of you that may *on occasion*, peruse some of the HP photo albums from the links provided on the <u>Pictures page</u> may recall that we moved to flicker™ a few years ago when Google™ changed their photo hosting site, and did away with their long-term (and easy to use) photo provider, and more importantly, changed their user agreements. We had made the transition to Google™ only after our first hosting site had changed their rules and hosting policy. So, over the years, we have used several different sites to try to achieve a cost-saving place for our pages and the many photos that we have in our archives.

Confused yet? Or, perhaps too much information? I am trying to give a satisfactory answer to legitimate questions. Here is more food for thought. I am not sure what is coming next. I recently received a very confusing explanation from flicker™, stating that they have recently been acquired by SmugMug™, yet another photo hosting site – and policies may be changing! I am afraid it will get worse and may become a fee based service.

We will have to wait and see what will be happening. I am sure that this is of little interest to most of our group and it takes away from the important things like the well being of our group and things that interest all. Suffice to say, at present, our web site is still current, and I have just paid the fees for the web site, domain registration, web hosting, and domain forwarding fees. We are current and paid through August 2020. Photo hosting is still subject to change, I will keep you updated.
